Second Sunday of Advent:

Readings: Isaiah 40: 1-5, 9-11; Psalm 85: 8-13;2 Peter 3:8-14; Mark 1:1-8.

Making Room for God in Our Lives

If we read the first verse of the Gospel of Mark quickly we can miss it's importance. It is really a summary of Mark's message. "The beginning" looks back to the creation. "The good news," these glad tidings. "Jesus Christ, the Son of God," let's not beat around the bush, Jesus is the promised messiah.

Jesus didn't just come out of the blue, his coming was prepared for. Israel had been without a prophet for 400 years, now John the Baptist appears in the wilderness. "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight" It is not by accident that John is in the wilderness, the desert is a place of deprivation and loneliness, the stripping away of comforts and a place of testing. The 40 years in the desert following the Exodus from Egypt was a time of encounter with God, a time of building the relationship between God and Israel. It was a time of conflict, but ultimately a time of intimacy with God.

John is preparing the way of the Lord by calling people back to an intimacy with God. His baptism of repentance made a powerful impact by calling people to a metanoia, a change of heart and a deep interior relationship with God. To recognize one's personal need for forgiveness. The time of complacency and self-sufficiency is replaced by humble contrition and a turning back to God who is our strength and our protector. In his baptism John uses both symbols and gestures. Calling people

to the Jordan River he's recalling the Israelites coming into the promised land and living out their faith in God as a community and nation.

St. Mark associates John with the prophets, particularly Isaiah, but also Elijah and Malachi. Mark explicitly refers to that part of Isaiah known as the Book of Consolation where rhetoric of sin and punishment is replaced by God's caring and concern for his people in exile in Babylon. Ezra links the end of the exile with the decree of Cyrus, the King of Persia while Isaiah links it to the decree of the Lord. The passing power of humanity to the unshakable power of God's word. Isaiah sees the return of the exiles – the way – as a triumphal procession, a reenactment of the Exodus and a revelation of God.

On a human level many Jews stayed in Babylon. They were happy with their new lives and not prepared to embrace the hardships of returning with a prophet to rebuild Jerusalem. Isaiah is urging them to accept God's deliverance. To recognize that God is with them with power, but also with loving care. He uses the symbol of the shepherd as one who cares for his flock, particularly the weak and the humble. He will remove the obstacles. As it were rolling out the red carpet, that they could pass through the desert with its trials and suffering and achieve the life that God wanted for them.

The psalmist points out that only people who fear the Lord can hope to enjoy his salvation. Attitudes of kindness and truth... justice and peace make fit a place for God to dwell.

In our second reading St. Peter is writing to a people who think that because the world has not ended and they have not experienced judgement that it wasn't going to happen. St. Peter points out that this delay is orientated towards salvation, giving us time for repentance and reformation. God will judge! What we have to realize is that he is not on our time table. He is immortal and eternal. For him one day and a thousand years are the same. Leading lives of holiness and godliness prepares us for the day of God, that we may be found at peace. We are called to live in the realization that time is short and that God seeks recreation not destruction. New heavens and a new earth will be realized by a people who do not become lazy or complacent, but who live in eager expectation. Advent is a time of preparation and expectation. It is a time to make more room in our lives for God by purposely seeking him out. By imitating God's care and concern for us in the way we treat others, particularly who cannot return the favour. That being more aware of God's presence in our lives we may become more aware of God's presence in Christmas.

These are difficult times. It's hard to plan when we don't know what will happen. Many plans we have made have to be set aside and many of our cherished Christmas traditions are no longer allowed. It's very easy to get upset and depressed. We have to make the best of it and know that God's presence doesn't change, only our awareness of it. As we prepare focus on God and not the things around and realize that we will have even more to celebrate next year. Fr. Patrick

Project Advance - 2023: Empowering our Parish Vision

This year our parish goal is \$160,000.
